From the Dean

At the outset of the **International Year of the Organ**, National Headquarters of the AGO launched a massive Phonathon in an effort to contact all lapsed members of the Guild from the last ten years. Members of your Executive Committee have called, contacted personally, or tracked down the fifty former members of our chapter who fall into this category. Because we were able to report on all fifty persons, our chapter is again in the running for winning the AGO Chapter Challenge--for the third time.

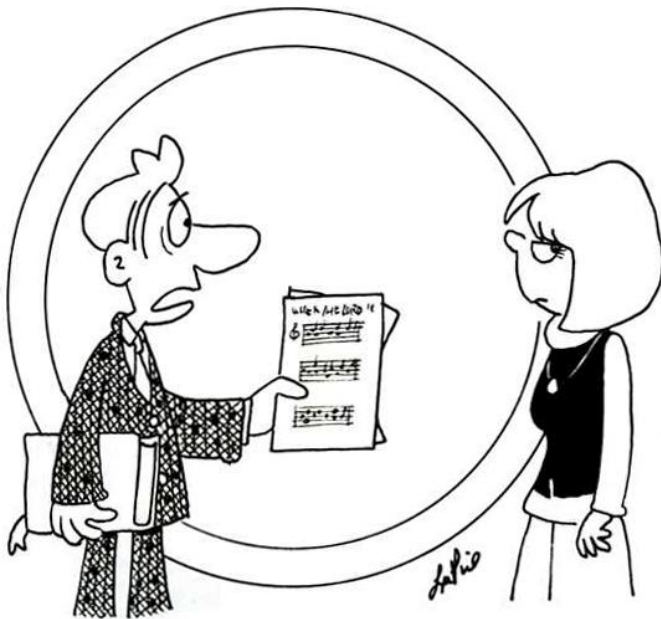


Bulletin Announcement

WORSHIPPING BECAUSE IT MATTERS: THE DESIGN OF EFFECTIVE CONGREGATIONAL SONG

Herbert Brokering, Carl Schalk and Robert Rimbo will collaborate to lead a workshop at Camp Arcadia (located in Northwest Michigan on the shores of Lake Michigan) on the dates of September 21 - 24, 2008.

Corporate worship through Word, Sacrament, and song is called "the source and summit of the Christian life." This retreat examines sacred song. Led interactively by three major thinkers about worship -- pastor and liturgical scholar Robert Rimbo, composer and musicologist Carl Schalk, and poet and hymn writer Herbert Brokering -- sessions will move from the setting, mission, ritual and community incorporated into worship, to the specifics of effective congregational song.

Schalk and Brokering will illustrate with poetry, melody, rhythm, and harmony what makes existing compositions work. They will also demonstrate with an entirely new text and tune of their own collaboration how this happens.

Rimbo will explore how liturgical sequences, texts, and chants unite a people in seasonal stances toward their Creator and Redeemer.

Aspiring hymn writers or liturgists are encouraged to bring samples of their work for comment. The retreat is aimed at those attentive to congregational song: parish musicians, pastors, supportive laity, teachers and students. Though led by Lutherans, the content will be for all liturgical churches.

(St. Paul, Minn.) DATE, 2008—*Pipedreams*®, the only nationally distributed weekly radio program exploring the art of the pipe organ, is coming to the Dimnent Memorial Chapel at Hope College for a *Pipedreams Live!* performance with *Pipedreams* host Michael Barone. *Pipedreams* is produced and distributed by American Public Media™ and can be heard every Sunday at 7 a.m. on Blue Lake Public Radio, WBLV-FM 90.3 (Muskegon and the Lakeshore) and WBLU-FM 88.9 (Grand Rapids).

This *Pipedreams Live!* concert will feature Hope College resident organist Huw Lewis and Hope College students and alumni showcasing Dimnent Memorial Chapel's magnificently restored 1928 E.M. Skinner pipe organ.

During *Pipedreams Live!*, Barone provides program notes, converses with players and the audience, and demonstrates the mechanism and sound palette of the featured instrument. On rare occasions, he might even play a piece.

About *Pipedreams*

On January 3, 1982, the first installment of a 14-program series titled *Pipedreams* was broadcast on Minnesota Public Radio and distributed free to the public radio system. MPR music director Michael Barone was both producer and host, and those programs featured numerous concert performances recorded during a national convention of the American Guild of Organists held in the Twin Cities during the summer of 1980. *Pipedreams* evolved from *The Organ Program*, which Barone had produced since 1970 for MPR's regional network. The AGO convention materials proved to be "good enough for prime time" and subsequently recorded performances from the 1982 AGO convention in Washington, D.C., brought about a re-launch of *Pipedreams* in October 1983 and the program has continued in national syndication since then.

The PHILADELPHIA ORCHESTRA in Concert with the WANAMAKER ORGAN

The soaring Grand Court of the famous Philadelphia department store—home to the thunderous Wanamaker Organ—will be transformed into a magnificent concert hall on Saturday September 27.

The **Philadelphia Orchestra** combines its resources with those of the **Wanamaker Organ**, the world's largest playing pipe organ. The organ has 28,482 pipes ranging from the size of a pencil to giants towering 37 feet tall. Performed for the first time here is Joseph Jongen's *Symphonie Concertante*. One of the most famous organ-orchestra pieces, closing in a thrilling pull-out-all-the stops toccata, it was written for the Wanamaker Organ and the Philadelphia Orchestra in 1926, but to date has never been played on the instrument for which it was intended.

This event is co-sponsored by Macy's and by the Friends of the Wanamaker Organ, and is a benefit for the Friends. The event is part of Macy's official 150th Anniversary Celebration, and includes a new composition by Howard Shore, who wrote the music for 'The Lord of the Rings' films.

Patrons purchasing tickets at \$500 and above are entitled to a lavish pre-concert open-bar and *hors d'oeuvres* party amid the Gilded Age splendor of the Mayor's Reception Room at City Hall. They are also entitled to a Curators Tour of the Wanamaker Organ at Noon the following day, with light refreshments and wine in the Wanamaker Organ Shop at Macy's. Holders of tickets of \$1000 or higher will receive a tax deduction for amounts above the \$500 'base price' of the ticket.

Tickets priced \$200 and above are in prime seating areas in the Grand Court. Tickets priced \$250 and above will have a direct Main Floor view of the orchestra. Lesser-priced seating is along the Grand Court upper balconies on floors two and three. Seating is extremely limited and demand for this rare event is expected to be exceptionally heavy—please purchase your tickets promptly.

Macy's is installing large TV monitors to provide views to those on the balconies.

*A similar concert in 1919 attracted 15,000 concertgoers. It was said that when the resources of the Philadelphia Orchestra and Wanamaker Organ were combined, the result was a "perfect Niagara of sound," transforming the Grand Court into a "temple of thrilling harmonies and soaring epics of tone." Nothing like this has been done in almost a century, nor is the event likely to be repeated in the near future. For the first time in decades, the entire resources of the Wanamaker Organ will be available, including the recently restored **Orchestral Division**.*

In addition to the Jonge "*Symphonie Concertante*" and the Howard Shore "*Fanfare*", the program includes organ-orchestra arrangements of the Bach/Stokowski "*Tocatta and Fugue in D Minor*," and the sublime "*Cortege and Litany*" by Marcel Dupré. All these works will be heard as never before in sheer sonic splendor as the world's largest pipe organ teams its resources with the formidable players of the full Philadelphia Orchestra.
